Club Registration

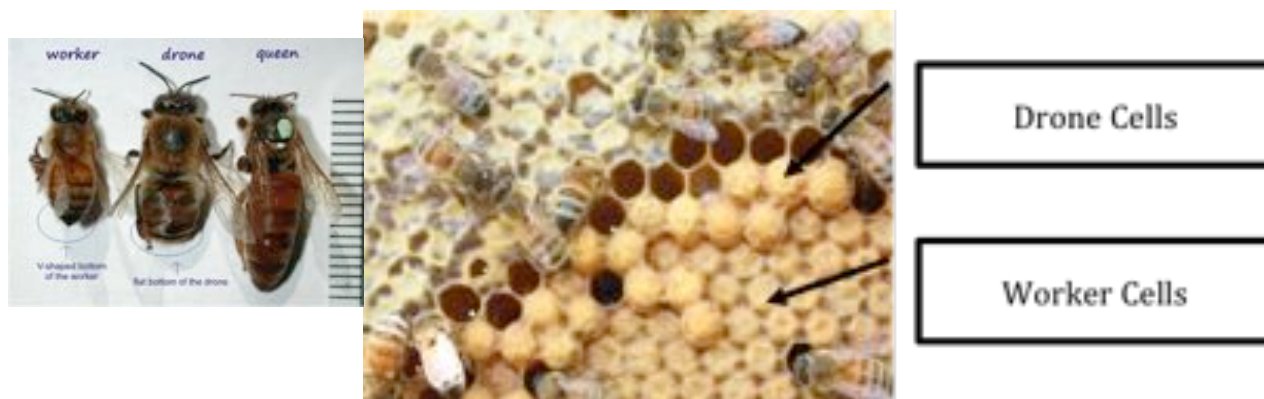
Before Club meetings all members are required to pay a \$2.00 registration fee.

Blue Heliotrope, Brush Box, Carpet Weed, Flat Weed, Coolibah, Grey Ironbark, Pumpkin, Red Stringy-bark, SilverLeaved Ironbark, Narrow-Leaved Grey Gum, Rusty Gum, River Red Gum, Tumbledown Gum, Yellow Box, White Clover, Hill Gum, Swamp Mahogany and White Mahogany.

Know your Flora

Most people know about the soaring redwoods of California and their record height, the tallest measuring 115.6m. Australia's iconic eucalyptus giants, however, receive far less attention, although they are close rivals for California's botany crown. Australia's mountain ash (*Eucalyptus regnans*) is the second tallest growing tree species in the world. The tallest specimen – nicknamed 'Centurion' – stands at 99.6m in Tasmania's Arve Valley. It is the world's tallest flowering plant and known hardwood tree. The species grows extraordinarily quickly, reaching its maximum height in 200 years, a rate five times faster than the redwoods. "The eucalypts do not live long enough to rival the redwoods in size. Historic records show that in 1880 a felled mountain ash was recorded at 114.5m in Thorpdale, 137km south-east of Melbourne, making it the tallest tree in the world at the time.

Bee Attack



From the USA, where else? The Maricopa Fire Department said that six people were sent to the hospital after a swarm of bees attacked residents in a subdivision of The Rancho El Dorado. The bees attacked people in a two-block-long area, the department said in a news release. Three adults and three children were taken to hospital for treatment of the stings. One of the adults had nearly 300 bee stings counted at the hospital. Two firefighters who were also stung during the rescue did not need treatment.

It took fire crews about two hours to find the hive in an opened water valve box at one of the homes. The bees were sprayed with foam, and the hive was contained and killed.

A particularly aggressive strain of honeybee has menaced parts of Arizona during the summer, with some people getting stung so many times that they were hospitalised.

Experts say the state is dealing with the Africanised honeybee, also known as the killer bee, which is a crossbreed between the European honeybee and the African honeybee.

The killer bee is the result of experiments in Brazil decades ago, and the insects migrated to the US. The bees are more prevalent in warm south-western states such as Arizona, New Mexico and Texas. If their hives are disrupted, they become especially aggressive.

Beekeepers online

As part of a push to encourage more people to become involved in beekeeping, the Honey Bee and Pollination Program has released a number of training videos on YouTube. The videos cover everything from construction and repair of beehives to artificial insemination. Beekeeper James Kershaw, from the Honey Bee and Pollination Advisory Committee, said while the videos were designed for newcomers, experienced beekeepers would also find them useful to learn about new techniques and ideas. He said it was important to encourage more people into beekeeping. "The average age for a beekeeper now is well over 50, so it's great to have younger beekeepers coming in," he said. "They might only start off with one hive but eventually they might go, 'Well, I want to make a living out of this' and go up to 300, 400, 500 hives. "There's a lot of people starting off with bees in the last few years, so this is a good way for people to touch base with some basic training." The videos have been produced to align with the accredited Certificate AHC 32010 in beekeeping and Certificate AHC 10 in Agriculture.

Remembering Ron Smith

Each year at the December meeting we award the Ron Smith Memorial Trophy to the club's most successful exhibitor for that year. Some members will not have had the opportunity to have met Ron, or indeed know his history with the club. Below is a précis of Ron's association with the club and we respectfully acknowledge his contribution to the establishment of I&WMBA.

Ron joined the Ipswich & West Moreton Beekeepers Association in October 1992 and was President of the Club for the 1996-1997 years. Ron was a very active President. He helped Noel Scholz build the demonstration cage which is still used at the local shows. During his presidency, field days were organised for the first time for the members. Ron also rewrote the Club's Constitution. Due to illness, Ron had to give up beekeeping in the late 1990s and he passed away in September 1998.
